One of the eternal goals of the North Carolina Society is to “Grow Membership”. In order to reach our goal, we should have a net increase of 200 new members per year. I’ve asked several of the older members, well members who have been in the Society over 5 years, “What are some sure-fire ways to reach this goal?” The consensus is you need to talk to people, you need to tell people about the SAR, why you joined, and you need to ask them to join. So, if everyone is doing this, why did we miss our 200 net new member goal for last year? Obviously, it was not for want of trying. We had the largest growth in membership in the entire National Society.

I propose we start doing something new, doing something a little different than before. I’m sure this idea is not new. I’m sure I didn’t think it up all by myself. Where do we find readymade recruits for the SAR? When we go to a Commemoration, who do we see there besides the SAR, DAR and CAR? We find both members of the local historical society and we see Reenactors.

I personally belong to two Reenactor Groups and two County Historical Societies. First, I wanted to support them because they support events I go to, events that are very important to the SAR. Second, I wanted them to know me and that I support them-I pay dues.

When we have these events, we should put up an informational table. Let the people know how they can contact us if they are at all interested in joining the SAR, DAR or CAR. I have been told that some of the reenactors look down upon members of the SAR because when in uniform we do not dress historically correct. These are 18th century reenactors who take their craft very seriously. When they see our Color Guard, they do not like it because we do not have the correct shoes, the hats are all wrong, the uniforms are not historically correct. First off, I applaud what they do because they want to teach something about history. Many are part of a Living History group teaching 18th century crafts, cooking, firearms, etc. Our emphasis should be the other things that the SAR does. Yes, we acknowledge that our uniforms may not be perfect to their standard, but we have many Veterans programs, grave markings, contests for elementary school students, contests for history teachers. The color guard may be the only thing they see, however.

Historical Societies are full of history loving people who just need that nudge to get them to join. Let’s promote the SAR, our Chapter to these groups. Let’s talk to the right people and show them what the SAR does for all aspects of the community. In this way I believe we will grow our chapter and the SAR as a whole.

August During The American Revolution

Many events happened during the time of the American Revolution during the month of August. Some were victories while others were viewed as defeats. The most important thing to remember is we cannot look at these events through the eyes of the Twenty-First Century. We must put ourselves in a time-frame of what the people of the day were thinking, and all they endured.

Beginning in 1768 on 1 August, the Boston Non-Importation Agreement was passed. This formal decision by merchants in Boston was created for the non-importation and boycott of such items as glass, lead, oil, paint, paper, and tea from Great Britain, and was a direct protest to the Townshend Revenue Act of 1767.

Moving forward to 1776, the delegates began to sign the Declaration of Independence on 4 August. How amazing and exciting time this had to be! I try to imagine how each delegate felt as he signed his name to this document, and all the emotions which welled up inside of him. The trepidation. The not knowing. Would they be hanged for treason or shot or imprisoned or tarred and feathered or would this document be received as intended or would they be viewed as heroes? Would anyone even care?

All during the time of the Revolution, and because many of the Native American tribes were allied with the British, there were attacks, and massacres. On 1 August 1776, a group of Cherokees attacked a Patriot force, and were defeated in Seneca, South Carolina. Beginning on 10 August through 12 August, the Cherokees were defeated by Andrew Pickens at the Tugaloo River, South Carolina, and the Native town of Tamassy was destroyed. On 6 August 1777, the British, with the support of the Iroquois, force the Patriots back to Oriskany, New York. On 29 August 1779, near present day Elmira, New York, after two massacres had occurred, American forces burned Iroquois villages, and defeated a force comprised of the Iroquois, Loyalists, and British troops. From an account in *The Wilderness War*, by Allan W. Eckert, "This was the battle that broke the back of the Iroquois League and the hearts of the people of the Six Nations", thus, ending the threat that General George Washington feared and set a precedent for how American forces would deal with Native tribes for the rest of the war.

There were also military victories, and defeats. On 27 August 1776, the British defeat the Americans led by General Washington at the Battle of Long Island. The Army retreats, and escapes under the darkness of night. The American Militia under General Stark were victorious at the Battle of Bennington, Vermont on 16 August 1777. That same year, on 23 August, the British withdrew from Fort Stanwix, New York, when they learn of General Benedict Arnold's approach. A little bit further south, on 25 August, British General Howe landed at Head of Elk, Maryland. A year later, on 8 August 1778, French and American forces besiege Newport, Rhode Island. A year after that, on 19 August 1779, Major Henry "Light Horse Harry" Lee led a nighttime raid, when American forces attacked Fort Mifflin, New Jersey. The British were defeated, and 158 prisoners were taken, although the fort and cannon remained in British hands, this battle removed the threat in the area. Moving forward to 1780, we now see how the war has shifted to the Southern Campaign. On 6 August, the Patriots, even though they withdrew from the fort, defeat the Tories at Hanging Rock, South Carolina, and just ten days later, on 16 August, the British rout the Americans at Camden, South Carolina, also known as "Gates' Defeat".

In today's eyes, we all know how these events turned out. We know the Battle of Kings Mountain is only a couple of months after the Battle of Camden. We all know the Americans were eventually victorious, as Yorktown is just a "short year" away. However, just imagine how the people, and the military of the time felt. In this article, I have simply touched on these events, and I leave it to the reader to do more research and learn what was happening during this month. We can look at these events, and think they were important or unimportant, however, the people of that time were living them day-to-day. They had no idea how the events of the day would turn out, just as we have no idea what tomorrow will bring. Let us remember to think like the people of the time and look through their eyes, and not through today's eyes.

A Call to Action

We have been asked once again to participate in the 132nd annual Old Soldiers Reunion parade in Newton NC, 19 August 2021. We will once again lead off the parade. We ask that all who will please be there in uniform, as Color Guard, with whatever firelocks and flags you may have and settle in for the afternoon. Details were just revealed that both parts are an afternoon parade. We will have a float and march. The first portion begins with dignitaries speaking at the Historic Courthouse while we muster at Twin City Insurance Agency, 311 North Main Ave, Newton, NC at 3:30 pm. Our float will already be in place on Colledge Ave. I am not sure which number we are as yet. We will muster and be lined up ahead of the other marchers and will be signaled when the speaker finishes. The entire troop will march two blocks south to the court house, wreaths will be laid, American Legion Post 544 will fire a 21-gun salute, and part 1 is finished. We will then be shuttled to S College Ave and W Herman St, our starting point of the parade. They will begin shortly after the wreath laying so the walk must be brisk. If you can't do both parts, please do one.

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Did You Know?

Phillis Wheatley was an 18th century intellectual who waged war for freedom with words. Captured as a child in West Africa, and taken to North America as a slave, Wheatley had an unusual experience in bondage: Her owners educated her and supported her literary pursuits. In 1773, at around age 20, Wheatley became the first African American and third woman to publish a book of poetry in America. Shortly thereafter, she was freed.

Influential colonists read her poems and lauded her talent. Wheatley's work, which reflected her knowledge of the ancient classics as well as Biblical theology, carried strong messages against slavery and became a rallying cry for Abolitionists. She also advocated for independence, expressing support for George Washington's Revolutionary War in her poem, "To His Excellency, General Washington." Washington, who himself had been forced to end his formal education at age 11, appreciated Wheatley's support and extolled her talent.
