Did you Know?

In December 1776, morale among the Americans was at an all-time low after the defeats at the Battles of White Plains in October and Forts Washington and Lee in November. Chased by the British, General George Washington had retreated from New Jersey into Pennsylvania. With his threadbare army, many without shoes and many with their enlistments set to expire, Washington counted on the winter weather to keep the British at bay while he and his leaders devised their next move. In addition, Thomas Paine's The American Crisis, was passed around the campfires, and assisted in the reignition of the Patriots' passion and resolve for the cause.

On Christmas Night 1776, Washington began moving his troops into place by ferrying his 2400 men across the icy Delaware River and then on a ten-mile march to Trenton. Behind schedule because of a nor'easter, which also forced part of the Patriot force to return to base, Washington arrived at the outskirts of Trenton where he daringly divided his force in two. While some of the 1500 Hessians escaped, 905 were killed, wounded or captured while only losing 5 American wounded. With this success, the Americans return a week later and attack Princeton defeating the British again.

With these victories, Washington proves how capable a leader he is at molding militias from different colonies into a national fighting force. With these victories, the American Army marches to Morristown for the winter.
