

Why was the Battle of Ramsour's Mill in Lincoln County So Important to the Revolutionary War?





After the British captured Charleston, South Carolina, British General Charles Cornwallis decided to invade North Carolina and take control of the state. On June 20, 1780 the battle of Ramsuer's Mill took place in Lincolnton. The battle was fierce, disorganized, and lasted around two hours. Although the local British Loyalists or Tories outnumbered the Patriots by more than three to one, the Tories were routed and fled down the west side of the hill toward the mill. When the fog lifted and the smoke cleared, the battlefield revealed more than 70 dead and 200 wounded, equally divided between the two sides. The unclaimed dead were buried in a mass grave on the hill.

 $This \ little-known \ American \ victory \ in \ Lincolnton \ lowered \ Loyalist \ morale \ and \ hampered \ the \ British \ plan \ to \ capture \ North \ Carolina.$

Did you Know? The Battle of Guilford Court House

On March 15, 1781, British
General Charles Lord
Cornwallis's army of 2,100 men
engaged a Continental army under
Major General Nathanael
Greene at Guilford Court House,
near present-day Greensboro,
North Carolina.

Adopting a tactic utilized by Daniel Morgan at the Battle of Cowpens, Greene formed his roughly 4,500 men into three lines. The first line was held by North Carolina militia. In the second line Greene positioned militia from Virginia. Continental Regulars composed Greene's third and most formidable line. Forming his men on both sides of the Great Salisbury Road, Cornwallis sent his men forward at 1:30 p.m. When the British got within 150 yards of Greene's men, the Americans opened fire. The British pressed on, returning fire only when they got within range. On command, the British surged forward. The North Carolinians fired one more time and then retreated into the woods to their rear, abandoning their equipment as they fled. Cornwallis' force continued on through the next two lines, and eventually took the victory, holding the field at the end of the day.

After the battle, Cornwallis, realizing even though they held the field, this "victory" came at a tremendous loss. He stated if there were many more "victories like this one", the British Army would be devastated and defeated. He had no idea exactly how correct his statement was.
