At our chapter meeting on 10 May, the Chapter recognized a couple of our members for their hard work. Compatriot Robert "Bob" Clark was presented with the Bronze 250th Anniversary Medal for points accrued. Chapter Vice President Rick Hubbard was recognized for all of the hard work he has put in for the Chapter in his role as Chapter Vice President, Chapter Chaplain, and Chapter Webmaster with the presentation of the Chapter Distinguished Service Medal.





Also, at our Chapter Meeting on 10 May, Compatriot Clark shared information with us about his ancestor and the unit he belonged to. Originally formed in 1775, the Independent Battalion of Westmoreland County Pennsylvania (IBWCP) was expanded in 1777 when General George Washington called for the states to provide more troops for the cause.

Clark brought along with him a copy of the flag - the original still does exists. Known as Proctor's Flag, it was named for their commander John Proctor whose signature can be seen above the IBWCP.

Created for the very first American troops west of the Allegheny Mountains, comes a battle flag known as Proctor's flag. Proctor's flag, made in the fall of 1775, predates the Stars and Stripes by two years and is the only surviving "Don't tread on me" rattlesnake flag from the American Revolution.

In addition, Clark shared about the Hanna's Town Resolves from 16 May 1775, which notified the King that Pennsylvanians were "annoyed" with him, and would be adopting these. Most importantly of these was the fact they would be forming a militia, training them and having them ready in the case of being invaded.





There have been some improvements and repairs happening in the area of where the Reinhardt Cabin is located. Although this is not an SAR property, we are happy to see that the area is being taken care of by the Lincoln County Historical Association (LCHA) and Lincoln County. From the pictures you can see the sign at the main entrance has been replaced and the HUGE pothole has been filled in. Also, the cabin was recently treated for damaging insects.

Also, and in partnership with the LCHA, the flags on the grounds at the Mass Grave, Warlick Grave, Shuford Grave, Captains' grave, and the Memorial Park have replaced with heavier duty, sewn, nylon flags. They have been placed out earlier than the upcoming events so the creases will straighten out.









Our Chapter joined in at several events this month. Chapter President Lightfoot and Daughter Lisa Pupkiewicz traveled to Charlotte for the 250th Anniversary of the Mecklenburg Declaration on 20 May; on the same day, assisted as part of a combined Color Guard in the dedication of a DAR Marker for Thomas Polk, who was a signer of the Mecklenburg Declaration, soldier, and Patriot; and joined the American Legion Post #30 Color Guard on Memorial Day (26 May) at the old Court Square in Lincolnton along with Compatriots Kevin Allec and Eric Minetola of the Colonel Alexander Erwin chapter.









Our next Chapter meeting will be held on Saturday, 12 July 2025 at 12:00 PM at Palermo's Family Italian and Greek Restaurant, 924 Conover Blvd W, Conover, NC 28613. We have several events coming up including those already mentioned, and what our future holds. Please make a point to mark your calendars and be there.



United States Army Founded 14 June 1775

The United States Army was founded on 14 June 1775 when the Second Continental Congress established the Continental Army to fight the British in the American Revolutionary War and in an effort to unify the Thirteen Colonies. General George Washington was unanimously named as its Commander-in-Chief. The formation of the Army came soon after the Battle of Lexington and Concord when the need was seen to have a standing army. As we know from our history, the Army defeated the British and the Continental Army was disbanded in 1783 although two companies were kept active. The following year, on 3 June 1784, Congress offically created the United States Army.

Today, the United States Army boasts over 700,00 soldiers.
